OAC Constitution

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OKINAWA ACTIVITIES COUNCIL (OAC)

CONSTITUTION AND OBJECTIVES

ARTICLE I: NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Okinawa Activities Council. This organization serves the secondary schools grades nine (9) through twelve (12) in Okinawa.

ARTICLE II: PURPOSE

The purpose is to initiate an organization of Okinawan District secondary schools for establishing standard procedures in conducting activities among the various secondary schools in all inter-school activities. All decisions will be made by the OAC in accordance with DoDEA Regulations as well as Pacific Area and Okinawa District Directives and Policies.

ARTICLE III: MEMBERSHIP

The members of the organization shall be:

The District Superintendent or designee of the Department of Defense Dependents Schools- Okinawa will serve as an ex-officio member of this association.

The principal or administrative representative, from the Department of Defense Secondary Schools- Okinawa District (currently Kadena and Kubasaki High).

A representative appointed by the principal from Kadena and Kubasaki High School.

Other members will be the principal or administrative representatives of the following schools: Okinawa Christian School International (OCSI) and Zion Christian Academy.

Administrators of other schools in the area in which the English language is used as the principal language and who are willing to abide by the decisions of the collective membership may be accepted to membership. Administrators of other (Non-English speaking) secondary schools may be accepted for membership upon unanimous affirmative vote of the members of the association.

ARTICLE IV: NON-VOTING MEMBERSHIP:

The committee will include in discussions two non-voting advisors of a specific activity during meetings. Representatives from the currently approved referee association or group will also be invited by the athletic directors to discuss rules, regulation and actions relative to the specified activity. When votes are necessary to make a final decision, only those listed as voting members will be permitted in the room.

ARTICLE V: OFFICERS

The officers of this organization will be a President and a Secretary. The President and the Secretary must be a member of DoDDS. These positions will alternate between Kubasaki and Kadena on a yearly basis. The transition of officers will take place on 1 June of each year.

ARTICLE VI: MEETINGS

Meetings will be held no less than once a month and at a time and place designated by the president. Exceptions to the monthly meetings will be determined by the membership. Any member school may call a meeting to be held at a time and place agreeable to member school administrators. One week’s notice of the special meeting is requested. During cases of emergencies and not limited to typhoons or threat conditions, the District Superintendent or Designee may call meetings. Phone or email votes will be taken when needed in cases where immediate decisions are necessary.

The secretary will record all actions during the regular meeting, which will be the official documentation to support the decisions made during the meetings. In cases of emergency, notes should be presented to the secretary recording decisions.

ARTICLE: VII VOTING

Decisions will be made by a majority vote of the voting members. The DSO representative will vote in cases where there is a tie vote. For the two schools having two votes, proxy voting is accepted. Each school must have one voting member present to use the proxy vote.

The two DoDDS High Schools may have exclusive voting rights on issues related to their schools only. This will be determined on a case-by-case basis. In these cases Zion Academy, OCSI and any other Okinawa schools will abstain from the vote.

ARTICLE: VIII Responsibilities

The OAC will serve, when needed, as an articulation board between FEAC and all Okinawan District activities.

ARTICLE: IX Funding

The DSO will provide funding support annually, based on the needs determined by the committee. An annual funding proposal will be given to the District representative to support district-wide needs to include, rule books, traveling trophies, and certificates.

ARTICLE: X Amendments

The OAC constitution may be amended by the majority vote of all members present. Any amendment to be voted on must be circulated in writing to all member school not less than 30 days in advance of the date of voting.

ARTICLE: XI Ratification

The constitution shall become effective upon signature of the District Superintendent. This constitution replaced the previous OSSAA constitution that was ratified in 1985, reviewed in 1990. The committee was informally disbanded in 1996.

OAC ACTIVITIES RULES AND REGULATIONS MANUAL

- I. Purpose: To provide rules and regulations governing OAC Interscholastic Activities Programs (IAP) that will achieve recognized educational objectives, best promote the traditions of sportsmanship, and provide an enjoyable, safe interscholastic program for all participants, spectators and supporters. These activities represent District wide initiatives that are inclusive of Far East Activities hosted by the district.
- II. Applicability: Applicable to all member high schools and other schools invited to participate in OAC Invitational Tournaments.
- III. Scope: The activities in which organized interscholastic competition and intrascholastic activities in OAC takes place to include:

IV. OAC Sportsmanship Code:

All persons connected with athletics realize that to play for fun and the love of the game does not in any sense of the word imply a soft, indifferent, or casual approach. The game is played to be won, but for every winner there must be a loser. To live clean, play hard, win without boasting, lose without excuse, and never quit are characteristics that distinguish excellent athletic participation.

A. Sportsmanship for athletes includes:

1. Seeking to win by fair and lawful means according to the rules.
2. Accepting all decisions of the officials without question.
3. Demonstrating good sportsmanship through positive actions during practices and games.
4. Recognizing that the purpose of athletics is to promote the physical, mental, moral, social, and emotional well being of all participants.
5. Winning without boasting, losing without excuses, and never quitting.
6. Going to opponents, win or lose, and congratulating them.
7. Accepting and abiding by the standards and experience of the coach.
8. Maintaining poise and self-control at all times; and
9. Remembering that player's actions will reflect, either positively or negatively, upon the team, parents and the school.

B. Sportsmanship for coaches includes:

1. Valuing self-restraint, fair play, and sportsmanlike conduct while in no way lessening the importance of winning the game.
2. Requiring proper attitudes and self-control, from all team members.
3. Displaying self-control and emotional maturity in all contacts with officials, and, if at all possible, confining disagreements with interpretations of rulings to the privacy of the officials' dressing room after the game has ended.
4. Fostering the best of relationships with the opponents and behaving with courtesy at all times.
5. Includes leading the players and shaking hands with their opponents following competition.
6. Encouraging players to do all in their power to win, but always to win with honor.

7. Teaching that to play to the utmost of one's ability and to lose is no disgrace, but that disgrace comes from winning by unfair or unsportsmanlike means.
8. Remembering that, because of his specialized knowledge, the coach is the most important example of good sportsmanship, and that the tone of conduct for team and spectators will be largely determined by the coach's actions.
9. The coach will be responsible to make every effort to reinforce among players the athlete's code of conduct as adopted by OAC.

V. DoDDS and OAC Regulations:

Participants in all inter-scholastic activities are subject to the following DoDDS and OAC regulations. The two DoDDS schools will adhere to requirements listed in section A5a and A5b, whereas the non-DoDDS school are required to adhere to section A5b and strongly recommended to follow requirements in section A5a. Any participation contradictory to the stated rules must be approved by the governing body of OAC and will apply only to this league.

A. DoDDS requirements: ELIGIBILITY RULES

School Administrators, Activities directors and coaches shall ensure that the following eligibility rules are observed in all DoDDS interscholastic athletic competition;

1. Age. Any student, who, on the first day of September, has reached or passed his or her 19th birthday, will be ineligible to practice/participate in athletic events. A contestant who is age-eligible prior to the first of September remains eligible throughout the school year.
2. Eight Semester Rule. A student shall be eligible for competition only during eight consecutive semesters after entry into the 9th grade and prior to graduation. extenuating circumstances may be the basis of an appeal to: **(the District Superintendent.) Correction: (to the Pacific Director thru the District Superintendent.)**

3. Undergraduates Only. Students in grades 9-12 may take part in the interscholastic athletic program.
4. 7th & 8th Grade Eligibility.
 - a. Exceptions that permit 7th and 8th grade student participation in an unofficial or exhibition capacity are granted for the following individual sports:
 1. Cross-Country
 2. Golf
 3. Swimming
 4. Tennis
 5. Track and Field
 6. Wrestling

b. These exceptions are granted with the following limitations:

1. No varsity or junior varsity team sport participation.
2. No overnight travel unless specifically authorized by the District Superintendent.
3. Participation does not exclude a willing 9-12 grade student.
4. No team points awarded for 7th or 8th grade participation.
5. All 7th and 8th grade participants are clearly identified before the contest begins.
6. 7th and 8th grade students are not authorized to travel to or participate in conference, district or area championships.
7. A 7th and 8th grade student may participate with the approval of the Head Coach

5. Physical Examinations

a. Before a student is eligible to participate in tryouts, practice and regularly a scheduled contests, he/she must have a completed physical examination and present a certified statement from a physician (certified nurse practitioner, or physician's assistant), that the candidate is medically qualified to participate in the designated sport(s). A form must be on file with the school Principal or his/her designee.

b. DoDDS assumes no responsibility for the cost of the physical examinations. An athletic physical is valid for one calendar year from the date of the examination.

c. DoDDS assumes no financial responsibility for medical insurance or incurred medical expenses as a result of participation in the IAP.

6. Transfer Students Students transferring must meet current DoDDS eligibility.

a. Students who transfer within DoDDS must continue to meet current DoDDS eligibility requirements.

b. A non-DoDDS transfer student will be eligible to participate in an athletic contest provided the scholastic progress is satisfactory and all DoDDS eligibility requirements have been met. The student may continue to participate on a basis of weekly scholastic approval until the official transcript arrives. In a case of this kind, a school must be able to produce evidence that reasonable effort has been made to obtain the student's transcript or the student becomes immediately ineligible. If upon receipt of the transcript, the student is discovered to be ineligible, no protest may be entered for the games in which the student has participated.

c. Students who are ineligible at a DoDDS or stateside school for disciplinary reasons, shall not be permitted to participate at the receiving school during the

sport season in question.

7. Current Scholastic Eligibility. Students who receive less than a 2.0 GPA and/or more than one failing grade in the classes in which they are enrolled are ineligible for competition. The following clarifications are made regarding the above stated policy:

a. All students will be monitored on a weekly basis throughout the season. grades during the quarter of monitoring will be cumulative to date for that quarter.

b. A student with one failing grade cannot be denied the opportunity to participate in practice or competition.

c. A student declared ineligible is not authorized to attend or participate at practice, be in school uniform at a scheduled event, or travel with the team to any away event, until regaining eligibility.

d. Schools may not establish additional eligibility criteria. Schools will provide intervention support services to students who have been identified as having academic difficulty. Examples of these support services include, but are not limited to monitoring sessions, tutoring, before and after school study halls/instruction, etc. This paragraph is intended to establish equity for all students, to include those transferring to other DoDDS schools and who wish to continue participating in the IAP.

e. Each school is to develop a specific plan for monitoring grade eligibility. However, to achieve uniformity, all schools must complete the grade checks by 4:00 p.m. every Monday of each week that interscholastic programs are being held. A student declared ineligible on the Monday grade check will be ineligible from Tuesday 8:00 a.m. through the following Tuesday 8:00 a.m. A letter of exception to this policy may be submitted to the District Superintendent for changing the day.

Correction: Change “A student declared ineligible on the Monday grade check will be ineligible from Tuesday 8:00 a.m. through the following Tuesday 8:00 a.m.” to read “A student declared ineligible on the Monday grade check will be ineligible from Wednesday 8:00 a.m. through the following Wednesday 8:00 a.m.”

f. For scheduled Far East Activity Council Activities, the final eligibility check will be conducted two weeks prior to the published start of said activity.

g. A student participant who has been identified as being ineligible for three consecutive weeks, following receipt of intervention assistance, may be dropped from the team.

h. Scholastic eligibility may be waived for students at the discretion of the

Principal if the student is classified as “special needs” by the Case Study Committee and the Individual Education Program (IEP) are on file. All other eligibility requirements, i.e., age, number of semesters, etc., must be met.

8. Limitation of Team Membership. Any player who competes in the first scheduled game or is a member of a given team on that date, is not authorized to participate in any other DoDDS sponsored sport during that sport season. Therefore, students are authorized to participate in only one DoDDS sport in the fall, one sport in the winter, and one sport in the spring. The District Superintendent can approve exceptions.

a. Students withdrawing from school on a Thursday or Friday retain eligibility throughout that weekend.

b. **NOTE:** There is no official DoDDS policy concerning (1) selection to varsity or junior varsity teams, or (2) playing time. As a practical matter, all students trying-out for a team may not be selected, and if selected, the amount of playing time is at the sole discretion of the coach. Additionally, all students must try-out for the team each year. Participation at the varsity level one season does not guarantee selection to the varsity team in successive seasons.

9. Competition Limited to Eligible Students. No high school shall enter athletes or athletic teams in any interscholastic competition unless they are eligible under the current DoDDS high school regulations, nor shall any high school knowingly permit its athletes or athletic teams to compete with another school in a game or contest in which an ineligible athlete is used. Teams playing ineligible players will forfeit any game in which ineligible players participate. Exceptions will be made if a player is discovered to be ineligible after his or her transcript arrives from the previous school attended. It is the responsibility of the student’s sponsor to provide evidence of eligibility prior to participation in any athletic competition.

10. For FEAC hosted activities the following will be provided prior to the start of the activity: host school will provide a “Code of Conduct” for student participants, and a “Code of Ethics” for sponsors, coaches and chaperons. Specific rules of behavior that comply with school, installations, and community requirements should be included. DoDEA Disciplinary Regulations will apply to all Okinawa District event and tournaments participants. Infractions of the “Code of Conduct” may result in suspension from the event and possible early return home of the participant(s). In the event of a student(s) being sent home early due to disciplinary violations the student(s) parents/guardians are responsible for any additional travel costs. Tournament disciplinary officials will include: host school administrator; a host district representative, a coach or sponsor from a school not involved in the incident, a representative(tournament/activity director) of the host school, and a coach or sponsor from the school involved in any infraction. As a general rule, if the misconduct or behavior results in official installation involvement (military police), the participant(s) should be suspended for the remainder of the event or activity. The host school principal will notify the host schools district superintendent and the principal of the school the student(s) involved attends.

B. OAC requirement:

1. A student must be adjudged a person fit to represent the member school by the principal of that school.
2. A student must be a registered member in the school.
3. The individual member schools will monitor academic eligibility.
4. A student must have signed parental permission.
5. Any student guilty of theft, illegal possession of property or drugs (including consumption of alcoholic beverages), of damaging to school or other property, and such acts as hazing or committing any act that injures, degrades, or disgraces another pupil, or other unacceptable behavior, shall be considered ineligible for whatever length of time deemed appropriate by the individual school.
6. OAC will not hear appeals on school code of conduct issues.
7. A student of any member school who has not been currently participating in that sport may not represent that school until (s)he has been officially enrolled in the school and meets the activity requirement. A student who changes schools on Okinawa become eligible immediately at the new school if (s)he meets the eligibility requirements of the gaining school.
8. Any student that is suspended from school for any reason will also be suspended from the athletic program pending return to school and appeal for reinstatement to the athletic program. The appeal process will be handled through the individual school Athletic Council.
9. Any student found guilty of a wrong doing by base or Japanese civil authorities will be ineligible to participate in any sport activities, pending review by the individual school's Athletic Council.

VI. General Procedures:

A. Game Limitations. All schools operating within a given schedule will observe common season limitations.

1. Post-season games are not authorized unless approved by the OAC.
2. Additional games, with host nation or international schools, not included in the published yearly schedules, may be arranged locally.
3. Additional games, not included in the published yearly schedules, may be arranged outside the commuting distance but must meet the following criteria:

- a. Approval from OAC with recommendation from principals of schools concerned.
- b. No cost to DoDDS for officials, transportation, awards, or temporary duty orders for coaches unless recommended by OAC and approved by the District Superintendent.
- c. Will not be arranged before 10 calendar days of organized practice of a sport.
- d. No entry fees will be paid by DoDDS.
- e. No loss of school time unless recommended by OAC committee and approved by the District Superintendent.
- f. Additional games are allowed as long as they occur during the published DoDDS sponsored sport season.

B. Practice Limitations

1. Members of high school teams shall not participate in a contest until they have practiced a minimum of ten calendar days.
2. Students transferring from another school's sports program during the season may participate in an official contest only after they have practice a minimum of five calendar days with the receiving team. It will be the job of the activities director to verify receiving students eligibility and participation at previous school.
3. The start date for Fall sports will be the published Teacher Report Date. Team practice sessions are prohibited by a coach or any member of his/her staff, prior to this date. The start date for the winter and spring season may be no earlier than twenty calendar-days prior to the first scheduled game on the published district schedule.
4. Prior to the start date of the particular sports season a head coach or any member of his/her staff, is prohibited from the following:
 - a. conducting or arranging team practice sessions.
 - b. coaching or arranging practice games.
 - c. using, or arranging for athletes to use, school equipment, uniforms or school facilities for team practice sessions or games.

Exceptions:

1. coaches may supervise weight training/conditioning during the off-season.
2. one week of spring football training is authorized after the conclusion of all spring sports. Participants may be in "shell" helmets, shoulder pads and shorts); however, no contact is permitted.

5. Any athlete or team participating in the DoDDS IAP is expected to participate in all DoDDS events and practices. Participating in a non-DoDDS event in lieu of a scheduled DoDDS practice or event is not permitted. Any athlete or team who does so forfeits, the privilege of continued participation for that season.
6. A student is expected to participate on one team per season, to include all on or off base local teams, re MCCS, 18th SVS Youth league and special club organizations.

C. Schedule

1. Changing conditions and availability of facilities frequently require modifications of athletic schedules. Accordingly, modification of a school athletic schedule may be necessary from time to time. Any changes must be submitted in writing to the OAC committee.
2. Official cancellation of an athletic event by the OAC committee/chair person, and the transportation office or military officials, due to weather or other circumstances will be rescheduled. If the canceling school does not honor a rescheduled event a forfeit will be awarded.

D. Travel

1. Schedules must minimize loss of school time due to travel.
2. Local transportation should be contacted in order to provide schools with the most economical method of transportation and utilization for the teams.
3. All coaches will carry Power of Attorney documents authorizing emergency medical treatments in case students are injured (to include student managers).
4. Teams will travel as a unit under the supervision of the coach and/or sponsor to and from the athletic event. The school principal can only approve exceptions.
5. Overnight travel arrangements are to be coordinated in advance between the visiting and host school. The host school has the responsibility for providing base information, local transportation, and the game schedule, for a positive competitive experience. Principals will ensure a request for orders is processed for the coach/sponsor, chaperone and students, when an overnight stay is involved or if the trip requires the coach/sponsor is away from his/her duty station in excess of 12 hours. The use of appropriated funds to provide lodging and/or meals for students' participating in the IAP is prohibited.
NOTE: Request for orders is to be submitted two weeks prior to travel.
6. Students are responsible for all work assigned during their absence. An away trip is not an excuse for missing assignments.

7. Visiting coaches are responsible for the conduct of students under their supervision from the time of departure until the time of return. Coaches or faculty sponsors directed by the principal are to travel and billet with their teams.

8. It is official DoDDS-Pacific policy that the visiting head coach is responsible for the supervision of all locker rooms used by his/her teams when visiting another school. He/she should be the last one to leave the facility after a thorough inspection with the host school personnel.

9. Transportation, as coordinated with the local transportation office, is the responsibility of the local Principal or Athletic Director, within the limitations of the school budget.

10. DoDDS will provide safe and cost effective modes of transportation for interscholastic athletic competition.

E. Officiating

1. Officials for athletic contests must be fully qualified. Rates of pay and number of officials per contest should be delineated in the approved district contract.

2. Regular season golf, cross-country and tennis meets will not require officials.

3. The local Officials Association will have approved lists of officials for each sport. If qualified officials are not available, contact the District Superintendent.

4. The host school will be responsible for coordinating contest times with the visiting team and game officials.

5. When possible, an official that is also a parent of either team should excuse themselves from officiating duties.

6. No less than 30 days before each session, the chairperson shall insure that each school has in its possession an accurate copy of the official rule book as designated for that sport. Each school shall notify the OAC chairperson of their needs.

F. Protests. DoDDS policy is not to recognize protests after the contest has begun until its completion. Officials' decisions during the game will be final and are not subject to appeal.

1. Letters of appeal concerning administrative decisions must be sent through the Principal to the District Superintendent. Impartial hearings may be held if deemed necessary. The District Superintendent will notify coaches and officials in question when a decision is made. Schools submitting an official protest are required to forward a courtesy copy to the Principal of the school or schools involved.

2. The procedure for resolving protests of athletic contests will be as follows:
 - a. A committee of three will be formed consisting of the following:
 1. The president of OAC or some other principal appointed by the president if the president's school is involved in the protest.
 2. An official.
 3. A coach from a school not involved, preferable a coach of a different sport.
 - b. The coaches from the teams involved should be present to clarify their position, but they have no voting power. Their presence, however, is not required.
 - c. The committee of three will:
 1. Inform themselves of the necessary information pertinent to the incident.
 2. Recommend action, if any is to be taken;
 3. Set a time limit for action to be taken, if any (e.g. make-up game).
 4. Inform all school in the league of the decision made and the action taken in writing.
 - d. The committee's decision must conform with the OAC athletic Handbook and constitution.
 - e. The committee's decision will be final and binding.
 - f. Judgment calls by officials may not be protested.

Cross Country

1. All meets will be conducted according to the most recent NFHS rules with exceptions approved by OAC.
2. All cross country meets will be held in a designated area determined before the season begins.
3. The cross-country team will be made of seven runners; the first five runners of a team will count for a team's points. The other two runners of that same team can push the opponent's points higher, but do not count toward their own team's points. A school must have a minimum of five (5) runners to compete as a team.
4. The League championship will be decided by the results of the dual meets, with a point structure for the season in place for individuals at said meets. The OAC Cross Country Island Championship meet will take place after the end of the regular season meets.
5. Awards: An honorary all-district team will be selected at the completion of the regular season. A traveling trophy will be awarded at the conclusion of the All-Island Championship meet.
6. Station monitors shall be placed along the course for safety and integrity reasons.
7. The maximum number of Varsity members will not exceed (25) and Junior Varsity members will not exceed (25).

Volleyball

1. Volleyball matches will be conducted according to the most recent IVBA rules, with the exceptions approved by OAC. (Note: See Sep. 10, 98, item 98.94H – OAC will continue to use international rules but the Far East Tournaments will use the **USVBA rules.**)
2. No varsity team member may be moved to the junior varsity after the (2) Kadena/Kubasaki match of the season. Rare exceptions must be agreed upon by all coaches and approved by OAC. This would occur only in an emergency situation, re: sickness, injury, PCS, etc.
3. Weekday matches will start at 17:00, unless mutual arrangements are made. A minimum of twenty (20) minutes and a maximum of (30) minutes for warm up before each match. When needed Varsity matches will begin a maximum of (30) minutes following the conclusion of the JV match.
4. The maximum number of players on a JV team is (12), with a maximum of 18 substitutes per game.
5. The maximum number of players on a Varsity team is (10) with (1) student manager.
6. Matches for JV and Varsity are (3) out of (5) games for a win.
7. Awards: A JV tournament will be held at the conclusion of the regular season and will be hosted on alternate years between the two DoDDS school. A traveling trophy will be awarded to the winning team. No individual awards will be given.

Tennis

1. Tennis matches will be conducted to the most recent **USTA rules**. Schools who host the Far East tournament will be responsible for making sure a copy of the rules is on hand during the tournament.
2. The boys and girls team will consist of five singles and two doubles matches each.
3. All league matches will be determined by playing two of three six-games sets. If the games are tied at 6-6 in one set, a twelve (12) point tie break will be played.
4. Home team provides two new balls per match.
5. Once matches have begun, coaches will not interfere with match play in any way. Players may not offer advice in place of the coach during a match.
6. In the event of rainout, the home team is responsible for making schedule arrangements as soon as possible. Most re-scheduled matches will take place at the beginning of the following week.
7. The players themselves will make all calls. If frequent violations in calls are obvious at any time, the home coach will assign a referee or linesman.
8. League matches on Thursday will begin from 15:00.
9. All entrees to the Far East tournaments need to bring one new can of tennis balls. Winners will advance with the new can and losers will advance to consolation matches with the old can.
10. Coaches and or tournament coordinator will decide prior to the tournament how seeding will taking place.
11. There should be no player with two byes in a tournament. And only in a consolation round should the by player have to win the next match to receive a point.
12. (2) points will be awarded for a win in the main draw, while (1) point will be awarded for a win in consolation. Preliminary matches, played to advance into the main draw will receive no points.
13. Players should be given reasonable rest between matches.
14. The maximum number of team members is limited to (18) players.
15. Awards: An Island championship tournament will be held in non-Far East years. A traveling trophy will be awarded to the winning team. This tournament will be hosted on an alternating basis by the (2) DoDDS schools.

Tackle Football

1. All football games will be played according to the most recent NFHS rules, with exceptions approved by OAC.
2. No football games will be replayed.
3. J.V. games will start at various times according to school needs. Varsity games at 19:00 at Kubasakai HS and for Kadena HS it will be mutually agreed by the schools involved.
4. J.V. games will consist of four (4) ten (10) minute quarters. Varsity games will consist of four (4) twelve (12) minute quarters.
5. A student may not compete in more that four (4) quarters of interscholastic football in five consecutive calendar days unless a make-up game is necessary.
6. Awards: An honorary OAC all-district team will be selected by the coaches at the conclusion of the season. An island championship tournament will be held at the conclusion of the regular season. This tournament will determine the OAC Champion. A traveling trophy will be awarded to the winning team.

CHEERLEADING

Varsity

1. Varsity team shall have a maximum of (16) members.
2. Varsity cheerleaders must be in grades 10-12.
3. The primary tryout for Varsity will occur in April or May for the following school year.
4. A secondary tryout will be held within the first three weeks of school.
5. Varsity Cheerleaders will cheer for all home basketball and football games.
6. Varsity Cheerleaders will cheer for at least one wrestling match, pending wrestling coach's approval.
7. Varsity Cheerleaders will cheer for away games only when the coach, sponsor, or approved adult chaperone accompanies the team.
8. During half time of home games, the visiting cheerleading team will perform first, and the home cheerleading team will perform second.
9. During period breaks at home basketball games, the visiting cheerleading team will cheer between periods one and two. The home cheerleading team will cheer between periods three and four.

Varsity Far East Competition

1. (10) members from the varsity squad will be selected to attend the Far East Cheer Camp/Competition, as allowed by FEAC guidelines.
2. The (10) members will be selected based on criteria established by the coach and/or sponsor.
3. All ten could come from the spring tryout. The coach/sponsor could elect to allow spaces for those trying out in the fall.
4. NOTE: FEAC should reconsider the timing of Far East Cheer. Since NCA is now leading the week, the cheerleading squads should be allowed to attend Far East in September to allow ample time for squads to incorporate all of the material/techniques learned throughout the week into the entire season. With Far East being held in November, squads only have a few months to use the material they learn throughout the week. Allowing squads to train with NCA earlier in the year would only increase the quality of performances for all schools. Also, NCA teaches many safety techniques that should be followed during practices and performances. Beginning the year with NCA/Far East would increase awareness of the need for safety during cheerleading.

Junior Varsity Cheerleading

1. The Junior Varsity/Freshman teams shall have a maximum of (10) members each.
2. If enough students are interested in JV cheerleading, one team shall remain a JV team, and the other team shall be a freshman team.
3. If there are only enough interested parties for one team, the coach/sponsor will decide how to divide cheerleaders so that both the JV basketball teams have cheerleaders for home games.
4. The primary tryout for JV cheerleading will occur in April or May, two weeks after the Varsity duty.
5. A secondary tryout will be held within the first three weeks of school, the week immediately following Varsity tryouts.
6. Junior Varsity/Freshman cheerleaders will cheer all home basketball and football games.
7. Junior Varsity/Freshman squads will travel to away games only when the coach, sponsor, or approved adult chaperone accompanies the team.
8. During half time of home games, the visiting cheerleading team will perform first, and the home cheerleading team will perform second.
9. During period breaks at home basketball games, the visiting cheerleading team will cheer between periods one and two. The home cheerleading team will cheer between periods three and four.

Basketball – Boys & Girls

1. Basketball games will be conducted according to the most recent NCAA rules for boys and NCAA rules for girls adapted for high school play with exceptions approved by OAC.
 - a. All varsity games will have (10) minute quarters and all JV games will have (8) minute quarters with a minimum of (15) minute pre-game on the floor warm-up. Warm-up may be limited to (20) minutes by the home team.
 - b. Overtime periods shall be three (3) minutes in length.
 - c. Half time will be ten (10) minutes. Half time may be extended by mutual consent to a maximum limit of fifteen (15) including five (5) minutes on the court warm-up.
 - d. 35/30 second shot clocks (35 for boys; 30 for girls) shall be used for ball possession timing for varsity league games.
2. All schools may play a JV game as a preliminary to a Varsity Game.
3. JV and Varsity ruling will include:
 - a. A player may not participate in more than (4) quarters in one day (junior varsity or varsity).
 - b. On request a (5) quarter rule may be used.
4. Varsity teams will have a maximum of (10) players and (1) student manager
5. Junior varsity teams will have a maximum of (12) players and (1) student manager.
6. Awards: An honorary OAC (JV) all-district team will be selected by the coaches at the conclusion of the season. An island championship tournament will be held at that time. This tournament will determine the OAC (JV) Champion. A traveling trophy will be awarded to the winning team

Wrestling

1. The **International Amateur Wrestling Federation (FILA) Freestyle Rule Guide** will be followed.
 - A. **Weight Classes:**

The following weight classes will be used throughout the season:

101 lbs.	141 lbs.
108 lbs.	148 lbs..
115 lbs.	158 lbs.
122 lbs.	168 lbs.
129 lbs.	180 lbs.
135	250 lbs.

*A wrestler must weigh over 85 pounds to wrestle at the 101 lb. weight class and over 94 lbs to wrestle at the 108 lb. weight class.
*A wrestler must weigh over 180 pounds to wrestle at the 250 lb. weight class (formerly heavy weight). *Minimums for 101 lb. and 108 weight classes will be initiated at the beginning of the 2002 – 2003 season.)
 - B. All other wrestlers may wrestle a maximum of one weight class above his actual weight. For example a wrestler must weigh over 115 lbs. to wrestle at the 129 weight class.
 - C. To become an All-Star, a wrestler must win at least 80% of his matches and wrestle a minimum of ten matches. There will be a minimum of one All-Star in each weight class, therefore if no wrestler has won 80%, the wrestler with the highest percentage will receive the award. (Nov. 92)
 - D. League meet weigh-ins will be conducted at the host school. Teams will weigh-in shoulder to shoulder.
 - E. Equipment: Head gear is mandatory and high-top shoes are recommended.
 - F. *Additional illegal holds for this league are the “*back suplex*”, “*guillotine*”, “*Westpoint*”, “*3/4 Nelson*”, “*Salto*”, “*reverse Gut-wrench lift*”, and “*Full Nelson*”.
 - G. Coaches are requested to stress the non-used of other illegal holds and to prevent their use .In an effort to avoid serious injury or death from weight loss and dehydration, the following practices are prohibited:
 - a) The use of rubber or plastic suits that prevent the passage of air. Cotton sweat suits are allowed.
 - b) The use of diuretics and laxatives.
 - c) The use of saunas or “running the shower”.
 - H. OAC League Tournament: Information regarding time schedule, weigh-ins etc. will be provided by the Tournament Director.
 - I. Varsity Wrestling will have a maximum number of (24) members, JV Wrestling will have (12) with (2) student managers.

Baseball

1. Baseball will be conducted according to the most recent NCAA rules with exceptions approved by OAC.
2. Normal scheduling will be two seven-inning games to be played as a double-header. Both seven-inning games must be of at least four and one half innings in length to be counted in the league standings.
3. Home teams will be responsible for the supplying of baseballs and hiring umpires.
4. A pitcher may pitch only seven innings of a scheduled double-header unless the game should be extra innings. However, a pitcher may pitch only fourteen (14) innings in a 24 hours period. (e.g. a pitcher may pitch seven (7) innings on Friday and seven (7) innings on Saturday or any combination of fourteen (14) innings in a 24 hour period. An inning for a pitcher will constitute the throwing of at least one (1) pitch to a (1) batter.
5. The current scheduling practices include a scheduled rain-date and procedures (the following Tuesday) for a second rain make-up. Verification of the rescheduling or make-up should be accomplished by the home coach as quickly as possible to allow time to reschedule bus transportation and other logistical concerns.
6. *The starting time of weekday games is to be scheduled by the host school, and Saturday game time is 1000 hours.
7. The league championship will be decided by the number of league games won. Tie-breaker process will be decided at the pre-season coaches meeting.
8. All-star certificates are awarded per team according to their finish in league play. Individual coaches determine recipients.
9. Varsity Baseball will be a maximum number of (18) players and (1) student manager.
10. Junior varsity Baseball will be a maximum number of (18) players and (1) student manager.

Track & Field

1. Track and Field will be conducted according to the most recent NFHS rules with the exception approved by OAC.
2. Events and order of events for all meets:
 - Shot put (boys 5.45 kg. – girls 4 kg.)
 - Discus (boys 1.616 kg. – girls 1 kg.)
 - High Jump
 - Long Jump
 - Triple Jump
 - 400 meter IM hurdles (boys)
 - 200 meter low hurdles (girls)
 - 3200 meters
 - 200 meters
 - 800 meters
 - 400 meters relay
 - 400 meters
 - 100/110 meter high hurdles
 - 100 meters
 - 1600 meters
 - 1600 meter relay
3. Limitation of Competition:
 - A. Varsity competition:
 1. A contestant may enter 4 events with no more than 3 events in one area.
 2. The number of running events any runner could take part in is increased to 4 as long as one of them is a relay.
 3. (3) track and (1) field, or (3) field and (1) track, or (2) track and (2) field. A relay is considered a track event.
 - B. Junior varsity competition is held in all events. Points will not be counted on a team score.
4. Number of entries in scheduled meets:
 - A. Entries are limited to (3) contestants per school per event.
 - B. No school may enter more than one varsity relay team in any one event.
5. Awarding of points:
 - A. Dual meets (2 schools): 5, 3, 1 with relays 5, 0.
 - B. OAC Finals: 10, 8, 6, 4, 2, 1 with relays of same value.
6. Starting times of the meets will be varied according to the needs of the league school.
7. Awards: An honorary OAC all-district team will be selected by the coaches at the conclusion of the season. An island championship tournament will be held at that time. This tournament will determine the OAC Champion. A traveling trophy will be awarded to the winning team

Soccer (Girls & Boys)

1. Current F. I. F.A. rules will be used with exceptions approved by OAC.
2. The length of the game will be 80 minutes. Two halves of (40) minutes each. Half time will be (5) or (10) minutes. The final decision on time will be taken by the home coach and communicated to the visiting coach and (4) officials.
3. For all games in the Varsity League, (2) two points for a win and (1) one point for a draw will be awarded. In the event of a tie at the end of the season, both will share that place of finish.
4. In case of cancellation because of bad weather or any other unforeseen circumstances, and the two teams are unable to reschedule the game, the score shall be 0-0 and each team will receive 1 point. This will be decided by a meeting of the coaches, if necessary.
5. Officials: The home team must provide four officials. One referee and two linesman, or a referee and local coaches as linemen, or as a last resort only, use students or parents as linemen.
6. (For Far East Tournaments, the following rules are in order); Players who participate in the Varsity game are ineligible for the Junior Varsity game on that day. Varsity players can not participate on a Junior Varsity squad. Unlimited substitutions are allowed for junior Varsity games, with reentry allowed at times allowed in the F. I. F.A. rules (when the ball is dead).
7. Home coaches are responsible for keeping everybody from standing along the side lines, this includes coaches, players and spectators. It is the coach's responsibility to see that the players on the field wear complete uniforms and those on the sidelines wear something over their jersey.
8. Players are permitted to wear other clothing under the soccer uniform for warmth, or to protect themselves when playing on artificial surfaces. All players are required to wear shin-guards and cleats on the field.
9. There will be a Far East Varsity tournament at the end of the season. There will also be a Junior Varsity tournament if possible. Seeding will also be by final league standings.
10. Students in the eighth grade MAY NOT be on any team.
11. Players red carded in any season game or tournament game are disqualified from the next game of that team. Only a waiver by the president of the OAC, could any ineligible player become eligible. Notification of all waivers granted must be sent to all league coaches by the president of the OAC.
12. A coach may start practices before the official starting day of the spring season as approved by the OAC. This practice will be for conditioning purposes only. No plays or organized field play will occur prior to the official state date for the league.
13. Varsity team is limited to (15) players and (1) student manager.
14. Awards: An honorary OAC (JV) all-district team will be selected by the coaches at the conclusion of the season. An island championship tournament will be held at that time. This tournament will determine the OAC (JV) Champion. A traveling trophy will be awarded to the winning team

Softball Club Guidelines

Need revision!

1. This is a Softball Club where the focus is to provide a friendly atmosphere to play softball as well as provide a learning experience for girls. League win-loss records are not kept. It is a short season with a one-day tournament at the end.
2. Rain out games are not rescheduled. The home team is responsible to determine safe playing conditions during inclement weather and must notify traveling teams as well in advance as possible.
3. Team uniforms are not issued but teams may have matching sweatshirts, caps, tee shirts, etc.
4. The home team provides the official – usually a plate umpire with someone to keep the book. Umpires have in the past offered helpful assistance with rules and game mechanics to inexperienced players.

Game Modifications:

Games are played to an hour or 5 innings (whichever comes first). After 3 complete innings, the 15 run rule may take effect.

10 players on a team.

Slow pitch softball with a small degree of an arch – pitchers are allowed to move closer to the plate if necessary to reach the plate with a pitch.

Both coaches must agree at the beginning of the game if the infield fly rule is in effect.

NO BALLS ARE CALLED. There are NO WALKS (no base on balls). Batters hit the ball or strike out. All foul balls are strikes.

Base runners may not steal.

With the exception of the above rules, basic softball rules apply..

GOLF

1. Co-ed team with a maximum of (12) players.
2. USGA Rules
3. 8 competing spots for Dual Matches
4. 4 Dual Matches per season
 - a. 2 at Banyan Tree and 2 at Awase Meadows
5. 7th and 8th graders may participate under the guidelines established by the IAP, and with permission of the Head coach.
6. Each match (dual match) will be worth 1 pt (1/2 pts for medal play; ½ pt for match play) Total of 8 points.
7. Tiebreaker= total strokes.
8. Awards: An honorary OAC all-district team will be selected by the coaches at the conclusion of the season. An island championship tournament will be held at that time. This tournament will determine the OAC Champion. A traveling trophy will be awarded to the winning team
9. The format for the tournament will be the following: 36 Hole (2) two-day tournament (with early release from school)
 - a. (1) 18 hole at Banyan Tree)
 - b. (1) 18 hole at Awase Meadows)
 - c. Tournament is suggested for play on Thursday and Friday-(Rain out of tournament will be handled on a case-by case basis, depending upon the number of holes played)

OAC Speech Contest

Major revision is needed, if applicable to this document

I. Date, Time, Place:

The contest is to be held in the spring in either March or April. The host school will be designated annually and the starting time decided accordingly.

II. Rules:

1. There will be a maximum of one entry per school in the category of multiple reading. In all other categories, there will be a maximum of two entries per category per school.
2. A student may enter three events, but not more than two in the same time period.
3. (May 93) Three judges will be assigned for each category with the exception of the Multiple Reading. The multiple Reading will be assigned six different judges from six different schools. Each participating school will assign three judges.
4. Available categories are: Multiple Reading, Original Oratory, Original Informative, Poetry Interpretation, Extemporaneous Speech, Dramatic Reading, Humorous Interpretation, Extemporaneous Literature, and Storytelling.
5. Detailed information concerning the format will be circulated by the host school at least one month in advance.

III. Awards:

1. The Gold, Silver and Bronze certificates will be awarded as follows for each individual category:

Gold Award – Recommendation from all three judges.

Silver Award – Recommendations from all two judges.

Bronze Award – recommendation from one judge.

However, Awards in the multiple category shall be made in the following manner:

Gold Award – Recommendations from four or more judges

Silver Award – Recommendations from two judges

Bronze Award – Recommendation from one judge

If only one student is recommended for a gold award, he/she will also receive a KPASSP All Star Patch. If no Gold Award is earned in a category, the next highest award will be sufficient for the All Star certificate

If there is more than one Gold Award, a silent vote will be needed for the All Star certificate. The Gold Award ballots will be returned to the judges and they will be asked to rank the Gold Award winners in order of:

First Place – 1 point

Second Place – 2 points

Third Place – 3 points etc.

It is asked that no discussion of the performances be held until the host school informs the judges whether or not there is more than one gold award.

The student with the lowest point total will receive the OAC All Star certificate.

For the purpose of determining the winning school trophy, the following points will be awarded:

For Multiple Reading:

Gold Award - 10 points
Silver award - 7 points
Bronze Award - 4 points

For all other categories:

Gold Award - 5 points
Silver Award - 3 points
Bronze Award- 1 points.

Fine Arts

OAC GUIDELINES FOR FUNDING SPECIAL FINE ARTS EVENTS

1. The OAC wishes to encourage the presentation of “extra-ordinary” performances, quest speakers, demonstrators, exhibitors, special events, and the like as part of our Fine Arts Program.
2. Funding for such presentations should be made available to all of the fine arts activities sponsored by the OAC with a limitation of 200,000Yen per activity per year.
3. Only one event per year will be funded annually unless the principals make an exception with at least a $\frac{3}{4}$ (8-3) majority vote of the members approving the activity. **(change came from May 16, 96 meeting to change the Sep. 7, 95 version of the Constitution, Minutes item # 96.18)**
4. Funding should be provided for a different activity each year as far as possible.
5. The same activity may, however, be funded in subsequent years if no other acceptable requests have been made by other activities.
6. Requests must be submitted to the FAC for review at the Second February Meeting or at a March meeting (if there is one,) the year preceding the event. If no proposals are submitted then, subsequent requests will be entertained at the Fall meeting. The following information should be provided:
 - a. Name and qualifications of the performer.
 - b. OAC activity involved.
 - c. Itemized breakdown of total costs.
 - d. Proposal how to absorb part of the cost through donated services.
 - e. Funds requested from OAC.
7. The FAC will then refer its recommendation to the Principals for final approval.
8. A final accounting of the presentation must be submitted to the Principals after the event has taken place.
9. Neither admissions charges nor voluntary donations may be levied at any KPASSP fine arts event.

FAR EAST MUSIC FESTIVAL

Needs revision.....

I. Date, Time, Place;

The Festival will usually be held in March at a school which has the capacity to seat all choirs. The Festival will begin at 10:30 A.M. and should be finished by 4:00 P.M.

II. Performance:

All choral groups from OAC schools will be invited to participate. Schools may choose what music they wish to perform. Each choir should limit its performance to approximately 6 – 8 minutes. If fewer than ten choirs participate, the host school will notify each if director that additional time is available for performance. The host school does not have to provide rooms for warming-up prior to the Festival. All participants will hear all choirs. One or two selections will be chosen by the directors in advance so that all choirs may sing together.

III. Evaluation:

Each year a qualified choral musician may be invited to give suggestions to each ensemble. Written comments should be made during the performance time. Since this is not a contest, these critiques will be given only to the respective directors. Suggestions should be given in the following areas: Intonation, Tone Quality, Diction, Vocal Technique, Interpretation and Visual Presentation.

The guest conductor will also conduct the combined choirs. In the absence of a guest conductor, one of the directors from the OAC choirs will conduct the combined choir.

IV. Awards:

Solo And Ensemble Festival

*** This was listed in the 1992 Constitution as SOLO & ENSEMBLE CONTEST with the following specifics:

I. Date, Time, Place:

The festival will be held in February or March at a should which can accommodate numerous individual and ensemble participants. The Contest will begin at approximately 4:00 and should end by 7:30 p.m. (**Note: From the 2000-2001 Sy, the Festival divided into 2 events: Vocal in Nov., Instrumental in Mar.**)

II. Contest Divisions:

There shall be two (2) divisions of contestants if necessary: those in grades 7 and 8, and those in grades 9-12. If the sponsors prefer, only one division is permissible.

III. Award Divisions:

There shall be five (5) division awards, ranking as follows:

(I) Superior, (II) Excellent, (III) Good, (IV) Fair, (V) Poor.

IV. Participation

- A. A complete score of all music must be presented to the adjudicator. It is recommended that this score have each measure numbered to facilitate judging procedures.
- B. Time allotted for solo and ensemble numbers shall not exceed ten (10) minutes.
- C. Special ensembles, other than madrigals, may be directed by an adult; madrigals may only be directed by a student member of the ensemble.

V. Criteria for Ratings:

Criteria for Ratings will follow those found on the National Federation Music Adjudication Form.

VI. Adjudicating

- A. Awards shall be used on the total performance of solo or ensemble. Medals will be given for entries placing first and second place. Certificates will be provided for all participants.
- B. Criticism
 - 1. Written criticism will be of a length and nature so as to aid in improving the performance of the performers.
 - 2. Criticism must be given to appropriate school directors to distribute to their students.

OAC Drama Festival

Needs major revision

I. Date, Time, Place;

The drama festival is to be held early in the year, either in January or early February, at a designated school.

II. Rules:

1. The festival will occur if three or more schools are able to participate.
2. Each school's principal must approve the choice of the play.
3. Individual performances will be no longer than 40 minutes in length; this does not include setting up the stage, performing the piece and cleaning the stage.
4. Set props, i.e., tables, desks, chairs, sofa, etc, will be provided by the host school upon request sent at least two weeks prior to the festival day.
5. All hand props will be furnished by the individual schools.
6. Performances should be chosen which require a minimum of lighting effects.
7. Participating schools should arrive 30 minutes prior to the event and should stay until the last performance is completed.
8. All make-up supplies and costumes will be furnished by the individual schools.
9. The Drama features plays performed by students from junior high/middle school (6 – 8) as well as from senior high school, making participation in the festival open to all students from 6 through 12.
10. Each school is responsible for its own sound effects.

III. Awards:

1. A certificate of participation will be given to each school.

FAR EAST Honor Band Festival

Needs major revision

I. Date, Time, Place;

The Festival will be held no earlier than March 15th at a school where adequate rooms are available for warm-up, performance, and evaluation. The Festival will begin no later than 10:00 A.M. It may last through the afternoon if necessary. At their annual fine arts meeting, the band directors will decide the exact format of the festival, whether it will be mass ensemble or a competition.

II. Performances:

Concert bands from all Far East schools are invited to participate.

1. Competition

- a) Each school may choose the music it wishes to perform.
- b) No ensemble should exceed 20 minutes in performance time.
- c) If there are available facilities, the bands will warm up at the same time, so that participants may hear all ensembles.
- d) Separate Stage Band and Junior High festivals may be held at the discretion of the coaches.

2. The Mass Ensemble band directors will decide the format at the Fall Coaches' Meeting.

III. Evaluation:

Each year a qualified instrumental musician may be invited to evaluate each ensemble. Written comments should be made during the performance time. Since this might not be a contest, these critiques will be given only to the respective directors.

Suggestions should be given in the following areas: Tone Quality, Intonation, Technique, Interpretation, Rhythmic Accuracy and General Musical Effect.

OAC Interscholastic Student Council
Needs major revision
If applicable to this document

I. Date, Time, Place:

The interscholastic student council meets three times a year on the September, November and March meeting days of the OAC. These meetings are usually held at a designated school.

II. Composition, Officers, Sponsor:

It is composed of two representatives per member school. From this council these representatives will elect each September a president, a vice president and a secretary, each from a different school. The sponsor will be a member of the OAC.

IV. Purpose:

The purpose of the organization shall be inter-school communication, the fostering of inter-school sportsmanship and wholesome inter-school respect, the exchange of student government ideas, and the development of student leadership. It shall not include the sponsoring of inter-school social functions nor serve as a method for advertising individual school or club activities.

V. Council Authority:

The council derives its authority from the OAC. It has the sole responsibility to carry out the purpose as outlined in the paragraph three. Any proposed dealing with items not consistent with the council's purpose must be approved by the OAC prior to its discussion.

SWIMMING

(MCCS activity)

This program has been run by the Marine Corps activities program. Guidelines have been established but the program needs to be re-addressed if we want to continue to issue Varsity and JV Awards.

Questions that come to mind:

1. Time spent in training/competition during the same season as another sport
2. Is this a club activity? OAC does not allow for club participation.
